This year we launched Project Search and solidified our commitment and partnership with Middlesex Health as our host business. This program manifests our mission, and we look forward to watching our interns grow!



### RESIDENTIAL





It is no surprise how difficult, not to mention scary, the last couple of years have been throughout the global COVID outbreak. It has kept families apart, disrupted food systems, caused an unprecedented challenge to public health, caused many company closures leaving many without employment, and caused an increase in mental health concerns in the world's population. We did not quite understand at the time that the pandemic would change MARC for the better.

Throughout the pandemic, MARC's residential staff worked hard to help the individuals in our group homes and supported living programs adjust to the "new norm." Finding some kind of "normalcy" for the individuals we serve was one of our primary goals. We all knew how meaningful the relationships among the individuals within our residential community, their families, and friends were. We kept them connected with their friends and loved ones virtually via FaceTime. Through FaceTime, they participated in virtual tea parties, birthday parties, and regular visits. These efforts helped to alleviate the frustration and isolation they felt during these uncertain times.

We looked forward to the time when our individuals could reunite with loved ones and spend time in the community. Once the COVID rates dropped, staff were able to resume outings. One of MARC's residential homes took a weeklong vacation to a lake house in Guilford. They enjoyed a much-needed change of scenery, the beautiful outdoors, the warm weather, and each other. The ladies enjoyed grilling, water activities, and time spent around the fire pit in the evenings. What a week they had!

We weathered the hard times together. The bonds between our staff and the individuals in our care have grown even stronger. We grew together as a team with this goal in mind - no matter what obstacles life throws us, together, we will adjust, overcome, and conquer.

### **EMPLOYMENT**

This past year has been one of growth for individuals in MARC's employment programs. Many individuals are just returning to job sites as many businesses closed their doors during the pandemic. As individuals return to those businesses, they are rebuilding their skills.

Having a place to practice critical work skills is integral to the growth of individuals in our employment programs. Sheyla Disomma is one such individual that has worked hard to grow her skills and to advocate for new opportunities. Sheyla wanted to try new jobs and learn more skills. Once Sheyla realized she could advocate on her own behalf to work toward the life she wanted, she blossomed.

Now Sheyla has a new goal in her sights: to move from group supported employment into transitional employment in hopes of being a Project Search Intern next fall. Sheyla is a strong woman who knows what she wants and needs to do to achieve her goals. We have no doubt that she will meet and exceed her dreams, and we look forward to watching her do just that!

Our partnership with Middlesex Health is moving toward the arrival of MARC's first group of Project Search interns in September 2022. Project Search is a one-year transition to work program that is designed for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Project Search interns are immersed in a host business where they experience extensive training, career exploration, and coaching in preparation for competitive employment.

Individuals in MARC's transition program were evaluated this summer for readiness and seven individuals were selected to be MARC's first group of interns. They will spend the summer preparing for the start of their internships and touring their new classroom on the hospital's campus. We cannot wait to watch them grow as they take on new challenges and spread their wings. As one intern stated, "the world is all ours for the taking." Indeed it is!





### **DAY SERVICES**



It has been a year of growth for MARC's day services department. The pandemic caused many individuals to remain at home with their families, but slowly they are returning to MARC's day program as are staff. We continue to manage that fine balance between staffing numbers and the number of individuals in our program.

As individuals are settling back into their programs, we continue to provide support to them as they regain and strengthen skills from the time they spent away from their programs. It is a joy to see their growth as they reconnect with their friends and communities. Seeing the individuals in our day programs happy and thriving brings joy to the staff that work hard each day to help them live their best lives.

We have added a new volunteer site, Valley Shore Animal Hospital. Twelve individuals regularly volunteer at the hospital where they assist the staff in maintaining the cat sanctuary! Individuals are excited to spend time with the cats and help to make their lives comfortable. Helping the cats at the Valley Shore Animal Hospital gives our MARC volunteers a huge sense of accomplishment.

MARC's day programs now have a staff member that is dedicated to developing a structured monthly program that focuses on providing quality services to best aid the individuals in our program in leading a full and productive life. As the curriculum continues to grow and become more diverse, those in our program will experience even richer experiences while at our program.

Our staff also continue to grow and develop their skills. When one of the individuals in our program experienced medical issues that resulted in a prolonged absence, our staff received additional nurse delegated training to help them prepare for his return. Ian has been able to return to the program he loves so much with a team of MARC staff who are trained and dedicated to aid him throughout his day as a result of these trainings. Ian is back and loving his program more than ever. He is still smiling and still thriving!

### Recreation

With flexibility and determination, MARC's Adult Recreation program has continued to piece together programming based on COVID infection rates, weather, and family feedback.

As the weather allowed from July to November 2021, in-person programming occurred outside and in small groups. Individuals participated in outdoor musical concerts, Farmer's Markets, mini golf, car shows, and athletic games, allowing us to maintain a community presence.

In March 2022, we slowly shifted our programming to include indoor activities such as dine-in restaurants, bowling, sporting events, musicals, movies, and shopping. We then saw a return to community programs such as in-store pottery, fairs and festivals, and community bingo.

A highlight of the recreation program is our Garden Club which runs from May to October. MARC's collaboration with the Community Health Center and the Middletown Garden Club provided 294 pounds of fresh veggies and herbs to the Amazing Grace Food pantry.

We provided virtual programs such as Book Club, Bingo, and Jeopardy throughout the pandemic. These programs continue to provide individuals opportunities to stay connected. They find comfort in "zooming" with their friends as part of their social interaction with each other.

MARC's Adult Rcreation program provides opportunities for individuals with I/DD to spend time with friends in the community away from family. Sal lives at home with two aging parents. Much of his recreational fun happens at MARC's recreation program. Many individuals with I/DD are isolated and unable to participate in everyday activities. Sal had the opportunity of a lifetime on this warm and sunny fall day. He had VIP seats in a suite with an all you can eat from the food buffet and a chance to spend part of the fourth quarter "down" on the playing field, watching the final minutes of the game up close! It was a dream come true. At the end of the day Sal was asked if he had had a fun time. His response... "It was like I was on vacation!"
